WAITING IN HOPE: PRAYING THE LABYRINTH!

The new Church Year begins on December 1, 2018. We shift from Year B to Year C in the Revised Common Lectionary (RCL). This is the guide for our Sunday scripture readings which many other churches use too. During the month of November we prayed and reflected on Stewardship with weekly bulletin inserts the last being on The Quiet Promise of Jesus' Kingdom. The theme of our Stewardship campaign was Transforming Generosity. We had one In-Gathering of Pledge Cards on Sunday, November 25th and will have another one this coming Sunday, December 2, 2018. Thank you very much for your generosity with your Pledge and if you still haven't pledged, please prayerfully consider doing so as this will help us continue to do God's work outside our church walls as well as maintain our buildings. It may appear that with our Parish Hall loan paid off that all's well financially. Yet there is always on-going maintenance, personnel wages and the dollars it takes to keep us operational and viable very day. Again, thank you for your past generous financial support and for your 2019 Pledge. It will help us build a budget as well as pay the every day expenses of running a faith community.

Besides celebrating All Saints Day on November 4th and having an Annual Thanksgiving Eve Eucharist on November 21, 2018, we also had a very successful Annual Regional Holiday Bazaar on November 10th. Thank you to everyone who made it the smashing success it was this year.

Our theme for Advent is Waiting in Hope. Everyone needs hope. That's the beauty of Advent - waiting in anticipation for Christ's coming bringing hope and light to each of us. We will open the new Church Year and Advent on December 2, 2018. A integral part of waiting is also watching so I'd like us to focus this month on Watching.

Have you ever been to Heathrow Airport in London? One of the things that used to be fun about driving to Heathrow Airport was, as you approached the airport, the road took you through a tunnel under the main runway and as you entered the tunnel there was this large airport notice on the side of the road – "WATCH FOR THE SIGNS." We used to laugh because this road sign sounded so much like an apocalyptic warning such as we hear during the season of Advent.

It is amazing how often the word "watch" comes up in Scripture and it is clearly one of the main characteristics of a faithful Christian disciple, that we WATCH. So why watch? What does it mean, to watch and why should we watch?

To watch is not the same as to look or to see – it is rather, looking attentively for something – keeping alert and awake so as not to miss it – like watching for the signs for Terminal 2 at the airport. Watching is hard – it takes effort. Doesn't it? Did you ever have the experience of driving to the MSP Airport in a snowstorm or bad weather and the layout seemed to change, construction was going on everywhere, and keeping your eye on the road and watching for the signs to your terminal was extremely difficult and you really had to be alert – or you would miss it? So watching demands attention, focus, being awake, keeping alert.

In Isaiah 21:8, the Lord says "Post a watchman." Let him announce what he sees. "Upon a watchtower I stand, O Lord, continually by day, and at my post I am stationed throughout the night." In the ancient world, large watchtowers were placed overlooking the fields – and watchmen would look out day and night for thieves or animals who would try to make off with the crops. The watchman would also monitor the approaches to the city walls. He would watch day and night for any signs of the approach of an enemy. At the sign of danger he would sound a warning and the town would shut its gates and prepare for battle. The night was divided into watches and at the end of each watch, a trumpet would be blown.

Very soon, this function of the watchman was transferred metaphorically to the prophet. The prophet's job was to watch, to literally be a seer – a watcher – to watch for the signs of God's activity and then blow the trumpet – warn the people of what he saw. Watching became perhaps the distinctive activity of the prophet. Watching carefully for signs – and then interpreting them correctly for the people, and sending a clear clarion call for action.

In Mark, Chapter 13, there is the same sense of urgency. And there are three verbs used in the Greek, one after the other, to describe what the faithful disciple should be doing. First, in verse 33 – blepete – look. Keep your eyes open. Look carefully at your life, at the world. Like driving to an unfamiliar airport – look attentively. Then, in the next verse – arupneite – stay awake. Don't live your life half asleep. Have you ever had the experience of driving for several hours and someone wakes up in the car and says, "Have we been through a certain town?" And although you're driving, you just can't remember. "I drove through that whole town and don't remember a thing." We can live our lives like that – half asleep, daydreaming through life. Jesus says, no, stay awake.

And then finally, at the climax in verse 37, "What I say to you - I say to all - gregoreite - WATCH. Watch for the signs. First - look carefully; second - stay awake; and third - watch for the signs.

One of my favorite movies is A Night To Remember with Kenneth More. It was made in the 1950s and is the story of the sinking of the Titanic. The scene which has always stayed with me is one which came soon after the Titanic had been struck by an iceberg. On the bridge of the Titanic the terrified crew was scanning the horizon, looking desperately through binoculars for signs of hope, and there – miraculously – just fifteen miles away, was another ship, the USS California. Everything would be fine. They'd be rescued. So they started frantically sending Morse code messages to the California – SOS. But tragically, at 11:00 pm the telegraph officer on the California had turned off the receiver and gone to sleep. The messages were not received. So on the deck of the Titanic they sent up dozens of distress rockets. The sky was lit up by them.

And then comes the scene in the movie which has stayed with me. The crew on board the California clearly sees the distress rockets. They were only fifteen miles away and the sky was brightly lit up. But the crew knew that it was the maiden voyage of the Titanic and so they just chuckled and said wow, they're having a great party – all those fireworks. The terrible irony. They didn't truly see what was there – they misinterpreted the signs, they did not look carefully, they fell asleep.

Wake up and watch! That is the message of Advent. The effect of Advent on you and me should be like the blast of a cold shower after you've gotten out of bed, sleepy and bleary-eyed. Wake up: Wachet auf. In Advent God is trying to wake us up. 'I don't want you to sleepwalk through life or drift aimlessly through life. I want you to wake up and be fully alive – and then you will see clearly.' WAKE UP. And then, secondly, gregoreite – Watch. Watch for the signs – the signs of the Kingdom.

Keep awake and watch for the signs. That image from the Titanic, of the officers on board the California watching the distress rockets and laughing, as the great ship slowly began to sink into the deep, is quite haunting. Isn't it?

I wonder if God is sending us distress rockets? Is our planet going the way of the Titanic? Are the Occupy encampments all over the world sending us a sign? Are we looking carefully? Are we asleep? Are we misinterpreting the signs?

What if God is sending you distress rockets in your own personal life? Are there signs in your life which are telling you that things are not right – that you maybe need to change, to repent, to alter course before it's too late? For part of the urgency of Advent is the promise of judgment, both globally and personally. Perhaps something is keeping you asleep. Perhaps a habit, or denial, or betrayal or some numbing substance? Maybe God's trying to wake you up so that you can rub your bleary eyes and see clearly.

Look clearly and honestly at your life – and take action. Now. For now is the time to waken **out of sleep. That is the watchman's trumpet call** – the clarion call of Advent. Perhaps tonight God will convince you that the time is right. Now is the time for you – a choice to be made and a decision to be taken.

This Advent God is calling you to waken out of sleep, to look carefully and honestly at your life and to watch for the signs. What signs do you see? For the time is fulfilled, the Kingdom of God is upon us.

Pray that we keep our eyes open, that we stay awake and that we watch for the signs in our lives that are telling us new things or pointing us in new directions. We will do this as we wait in hope for the coming of Our Savior into our hearts again and the hearts of those around us. Make use of the labyrinth this Advent. Use it on Sunday after our Coffee Fellowship or at other times during the week if you have a key or at office times on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday when Jen is in the office. It's a wonderful spiritual tool that will surprise and impact you the more you use it.

Don't forget our Annual Inter-Generational All Parish Advent/Christmas Pageant on Sunday, December 16, 2018. We will learn about the many customs of different countries, sing beautiful hymns and be together with our youth as we continue "waiting in hope" for Jesus.

Lastly, please come to our Annual Christmas Candlelight Festive Eucharist on Monday, December 24, 2018, at 5:00 pm. We will have a Hymn Sing-A-Long at 4:40 pm with a very moving and meaningful liturgy following it at 5:00 pm. I know that some of you open gifts on Christmas Eve. Please prayerfully consider coming to church before you open your gifts, enjoy some sherry and toast and go home and open your gifts with the rest of the evening being wholly yours.

Have a very rewarding Advent full of new beginnings and eye opening insights as you wait for the coming of the Christ Child! May your Christmas be truly a happy one filled with peace and joy for you and your family! Our faith community has been truly blessed with each of you and all our new people. Thank you for all you do and have given in time, talent and treasure to build up the Body of Christ here at Holy Trinity! Stay well, be good of heart, and let go, let God! Pray every day that our lives and example continue to attract people to Jesus Christ and Holy Trinity! Have a Blessed Advent and Christmas season!

The Makings of a Conspiracy

Over a decade ago, a few pastors were lamenting how they'd come to the end of an Advent season exhausted and sensing they'd *missed it* – the awe-inducing, soul-satisfying mystery of the incarnation.

For many of us, we were drowning in a sea of financial debt and endless lists of gifts to buy. We struggled to find the connection between our Christmas to-do lists and the story of Jesus' birth.

An overwhelming stress had overtaken worship and celebration.

The time of year when focusing on Christ should be the easiest was often the hardest. Somehow, this had become the new normal.

So, in 2006, three pastors, Chris Seay, Greg Holder, and Rick McKinley, decided to try something different. They called it the Advent Conspiracy movement, and came up with four tenets—Worship Fully, Spend Less, Give More, Love All—to guide themselves, their families, and congregations through the Christmas season.

GIVE MORE

LOVE ALL





Nearly every character in the Christmas story that encountered our King responded in the same way: worship. Let's make the conscious effort to reorient our hearts toward Christ. Christmas began with worship, may it end with worship.



In our hearts we know mindless consumption is not the way to celebrate Jesus. But spending less does not mean spending nothing. Rather we will thoughtfully evaluate what companies and causes we support through our purchases.



The best gifts celebrate a relationship and most often they require our time and energy. Relational giving means that we think about the other person-who they are and what they care about. We focus more on giving our undivided presence and less on a pile of presents under the tree.



Christmas is a chance to move closer to those in crisis. We will love others as Jesus has loved us. The poor and hurting of our world can be reached by God through the way we choose to celebrate Christmas.

The movement started small—just a handful of churches who would try this experiment and make the Advent story personal again. That first Christmas they got creative, changed their traditions, and ended up raising enough money for a water-well in West Africa.

The news spread quickly, a book was written, videos were created, and along the way a revolution was born.


Today

Over the last decade, thousands of churches have celebrated with more relational traditions, partnered with more organizations, and have channeled more resources to the poor, marginalized, and forgotten.

Advent Conspiracy is about the entire body of Christ at work in the world. As we worship fully, spend less, give more, and love all, something begins to happen that is greater than any single person, church, or denomination. As the Church, we are telling the story of Jesus to the watching world.

Our prayer is that more churches join together to live out the story of Jesus' sacrificial love. God is not finished with our world and He is inviting us deeper into the







How to walk the labyrinth

Unlike a maze, a labyrinth has just one path, so there are no tricks to it and no dead ends. It is a two-way path, so you may meet others coming or going on the path.

Three stages of the walk

- Purgation (Releasing) ~ A releasing, a letting go of the details of your life. This is the act of shedding thoughts and distractions. A time to open the heart and quiet the mind.
- Illumination (Receiving) ~ When you reach the center, stay there as long as you like. It is a place of meditation and prayer. Receive what is there for you to receive.


Union (Returning) ~ As you leave, following the same path out of the center as you came in, you enter the third stage, which is joining God, your Higher Power, or the healing forces at work in the world. Each time you walk the labyrinth you become more empowered to find and do the work for which you feel your soul is reaching.

Guidelines for the walk

Quiet your mind and become aware of your breath. Allow yourself to find the pace your body wants to go. Since the path is two-way, those going in will meet those coming out. You may "pass" people or let others step around you. Do what feels natural. Walk the labyrinth with an open mind and an open heart.

WHY BLUE IN ADVENT?

Advent marks the beginning of the liturgical new year and is a time when we ponder the coming of Christ in time, as the Babe of Bethlehem, and at the end of time as our Judge and Redeemer. The word advent comes to us from the Latin meaning "to come."

As way to mark this season of expectation and hope, we wear blue vestments during Advent. This is a recovery of an ancient English tradition stemming from Salisbury Cathedral and so is sometimes referred to as sarum blue. (Sarum being the ancient Latin name for Salisbury.) While the deep blue conveys a feeling of solemnity because of its association with the Blessed Virgin Mary it also conveys the Advent themes of hope and expectation. On the Third Sunday in Advent we see hints of pink on the vestments marking that Sunday as Gaudete Sunday reflecting the opening words of the ancient introit appointed for the day: Rejoice in the Lord, always!


