May was another "banner" month for us as we completed Spring Clean-Up on Sunday, May 5, 2019, cleaning both the outside campus as well as the Parish Hall and church proper. Thanks to all of you who helped with the clean-up. Your time doing this much needed ministry is very much appreciated.

We celebrated Mother's Day on May 13th honoring all the women of the parish and praying for our living and deceased mothers. Every woman in attendance that day received a corsage in honor of the occasion. Scott Svoboda gave every woman a rose. Thanks, Scott, for this gift. Most important, special thanks to all the women for their contributions all year long to the building up of the Body of Christ at Holy Trinity.

The 3rd Annual Spring Concert with the North Star Boys' Choir was an outstanding success with new people from St. Cloud and Wayzata with us for the first time as well as other returning fans. The Choir is internationally recognized and will leave for Lyon, France, on June 7th. Thanks to Francis Stockwell for their stellar performance and to all of you who came. Those present gave \$478.00 to help support the work and ministry of the Choir. Thank you again. I hope that more of you will come next year.

As of this writing, Pentecost will not have occurred yet as well as our patronal feast, the Holy Trinity, on June 16th. Please remember to bring your red noses on that day - Pentecost Sunday - as well as a red geranium for the sanctuary and outside planter.

In the May issue, I wrote about Pentecost and how best to understand and prepare for the most important celebration of the church year. In this issue, I'd like to focus on getting rid of the obstacles that my be keeping us from a relationship with God and on the good news of repentance which isn't limited to the season of Lent.

There are times in our lives when we recognize that there is an obstacle, something, that is separating us from God. Maybe you're dealing with it now or have in the past.

Sometimes it is an obstacle of our own making, something we have done or said, perhaps a choice that we made that now we deeply regret. We may feel guilty, or ashamed, or afraid. We may be reluctant to show our face before God. This thing that we have done has become a barrier between us and God.

Sometimes it is something that has happened to us, perhaps something that we don't understand or don't feel we deserved, and because we can't make sense of it we fault God, and there is born

in us a new fear or anger towards God, and a reluctance to trust that renders intimacy with God impossible.

Sometimes it is something that we know we should do but have avoided doing perhaps because it seemed too costly or too difficult or too humiliating to do this thing even though we knew it was right. But now this thing that was left undone stands as a barrier between God and us and we know that our communion with God cannot be restored until we do what we can to set things right.

Sometimes the obstacle is something that we used to believe but no longer believe – about God, or about life, or about our faith, or about the world and because we have not been able to reconcile this gap between what we used to believe and what we now believe, our faith has stalled and our relationship with God has lost its passion.

Whatever it is, this obstacle stands as a dividing wall between God and us. We may have tried – or may still be trying – to get over it or around it but it is still there. We may have tried to pretend it wasn't a big deal but in fact it was, and still is. We may be simply ignoring it, like the proverbial elephant in the living room, pretending not to notice it or wishing it would just go away; but deep in our hearts knowing that it is affecting our ability to love God and to be loved by God.

Today there is a voice echoing from the wilderness that invites you and me to come, assuring us that this obstacle, this mountain, that has grown up between us and God has been leveled by the coming of God's Messiah and assuring us that God is ready and eager to receive us, to forgive us, to heal us, and to reconcile us to himself.

Isaiah the prophet addresses himself to the people of Israel who have been taken captive by a foreign power and carried away from their homeland to live in the land of their oppressors. They understand that their situation was brought about by their own pride, negligence and sin, and they see the events that have unfolded as God's rightful punishment for their stubborn and rebellious ways. But now God's word comes to them through the prophet Isaiah, speaking comfort and tenderly assuring them that their suffering is ending and that God is preparing a straight way through the wilderness so that they might return to God and once again behold God's glory. Read Isaiah 40:1-11.

"Comfort, O comfort my people," God instructs the prophet, "Speak tenderly to Jerusalem, and cry to her that she has served her term, that her penalty is paid, that she has received from the Lord's hand double for all her sins. "Tell her to "prepare the way of the Lord (in the wilderness)" and "make straight in the desert a highway for our God." Say to her, "Get you up to a high mountain, O Zion, herald of good tidings; lift up your voice with strength, O Jerusalem, herald of good tidings, lift it up, do not fear; say to the cities of Judah, 'Here is your God!" Here is our God, ready to meet us.

Come. Return to God. Valleys are being lifted up and mountains and hills are being made low. Uneven ground is being leveled and rough places are being smoothed. Every obstacle is being removed and the way is being made easy and straight. Come, return to God.

In much the same way, John's voice echoes in the wilderness, inviting the crowds to repent and to return to God. God is about to do a new thing, John tells them; the way is being readied for the coming of God's Messiah and for the coming of God's reign on earth. Now is the time of salvation, healing and reconciliation! Come!

And they came - "from the whole Judean countryside" and from Jerusalem, confessing their sins and receiving the "baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins" that God was offering them through John. Let me point out to you that what they are doing - confessing their sins - is not a normal thing to do. The normal thing is to hide our sins, to pretend that we are not at fault, to deflect the blame towards others for the messiness of our lives and the craziness of our world. The normal thing is to keep secrets, fear

exposure, resist honesty, and deny truth. Surprisingly here they are, confessing their sins, allowing the obstacles that have kept them from experiencing the love of God to be removed, making their way back home and into the arms of God's loving embrace.

Come, repent, return to God. Whatever is keeping you apart from God, it's time to deal with it, confess it, and clear it away! There is no longer any barrier to separate you from God's love. No fear, no shame, no regret.... no thing done or left undone.... no sin, no disobedience, no rebellion. God is clearing it all away by declaring his love for you and by extending his arms to you and by saying to you in the gentlest voice possible, "Come." Mountains are being leveled and valleys filled; rough places are being made smooth, the way is being made so very accessible, just so that you may come... freely.... here and now. God's call to repentance – the invitation to confess our sins, to open our hearts, to change our minds, and to turn in a new direction – is GOOD NEWS, not bad news. Can you accept it in your heart? It is good news because God is saying to us that we can come home, that all barriers and obstacles have been removed, and that there is no longer any need or reason to hold back or run away or hide. Whatever stands between you and God can be

overcome. No matter what sin or fear or guilt or sense of failure or doubt or shame or physical, mental or emotional pain has kept you apart from God, whatever obstacle has gotten in the way, it need no longer separate you from the love of the One who created you and redeemed you and cherishes you as the 'apple of his eye.'

Have you understood these things? Then throw off the shackles that have bound you and

Have you understood these things? Then throw off the shackles that have bound you and the chains that have weighed you down. Cast away the fear and doubt and guilt and shame that have kept you from becoming the child of God that you are. And come.

Come to be forgiven. Come to be healed. Come to be encouraged. Come to be loved. Come to be saved. Come to be fed. Come.

Pray that we accept God's invitation for healing and forgiveness. Let us ask the help and support of the Holy Spirit this Pentecost season for the wisdom, understanding and grace we need to move forward in our lives. Turn yourself over to Christ and see how you will be transformed accepting God's love and mercy in your life.

There are so many events and ministries taking place in June. Consider the ministry of being with a homeless family in transition on Saturday, June 8th, at the Great River Family Promise house down from the Methodist Church and volunteer to be Christ's hands and feet by packing food at Feed My Starving Children on Saturday, June 22, 2019.

New Member Induction will be on Sunday, June 16th and Episcopal 101 will be held on June 9th. See the rest of the newsletter for details. Graduate Recognition Day will be on Sunday, June 23, 2019.

Lastly, pray for me as I pray for you everyday that you and I may come to know Jesus even more and bring others to know and love him in the process. Thank you being disciples of Jesus and for all you do to build up the Body of Christ at Holy Trinity! We are "on the grow" for Christ. Have a phenomenal month and stay well, be good of heart and let go, let God!

Great River Family Promise Ministry Day


Come join Deacon Georgia for an hour or so from 10:00am to 5:00pm on Saturday, June 8th to partner with Great River Family Promise.

FEED MY STARVING CHILDREN MINISTRY DAY

SATURDAY, JUNE 22, 2019, 11:00 am to 12:30 pm. Won't you join with other Trinitarians to pack food for starving children around the world?

On Wednesday May 22nd, Ann Wedl and I met at CAER for a tour and a conversation with Wendy Erlien, the Volunteer and Outreach Manager. We completed a tour of the space, both the front, where the donations are distributed, and in the back, where donations are sorted through.

CAER stands for *Community Aid Elk River* and serves families and individuals with food insecurities in Elk River, Otsego, and Zimmerman. It is important to note that they are a food supplemental program. In addition, they also can offer connections for financial assistance and winter wear, if families/individuals qualify. They serve about *600 to 650 households per month*. They also provide *food outreach* to seniors, schools, Open Doors for Youth, as well as *provide Kidz Kitz food packages weekly to about 200-250 kids every week all summer*. They also do a school supplies event in the fall for kids and youth.

In March, thanks to Ben Bastyr's question and leadership, we as a faith community gave over \$1,000.00 to CAER for MN Food Share Month, and in April we Packed Our Pews with close to 400 lbs of food. I am still astounded and overjoyed by that abundance we bestowed on our neighbors in need. Those actions also speak boldly and loudly to our shared interest and compassion for those around us who are down on their luck, just needing a little extra help, or need an open hand to make ends meet.

In my sermon that Sunday, I believe I asked the question like this: Do we at Holy Trinity want to do more relationally with our neighbors in addition to giving donations? In following God's call for us to have open hands to our neighbors all the time, do we want to take a risk to go out beyond our red doors and meet our neighbors where they are at?

Wendy expressed that there is need now for about 4-5 volunteers about every four weeks for a 2 ½ hour time frame, both morning and afternoon/evening, to assist families through the process of getting food. Why not us? They also would welcome volunteers sorting out the donations in the back. Is that something we would like to give a try? We could also get creative as a faith community and pick a one-time event to bring all our gifts and our hands-on naturedly way of getting things done to sort together at the CAER site. What a way to share our uniqueness and being a Beloved Community! What a way to share the love of Jesus!

Ann and I are looking for folks to help us dream this into being. Help us plan out a survey or create new ways to try partnering with CAER and bring even more light to our neighborhood. Please pull me aside if you are interested. I am aiming for July to bring a group together. Please pray about what you might want to bring to CAER and your neighborhood.


