A HAPPY AND BLESSED NEW YEAR TO EACH OF YOU AND YOUR FAMILY!

Advent came and flew by us. Didn't it? I hope that you spent time in prayer and reflection about preparing yourself to receive Jesus anew in your hearts. Dick and Ginny Anderson lit the candle of hope, Dave and Julie Raitz lit the candle of peace, Dan and Linda Krieger lit the candle of joy, Rosemary and Bob Sobalvarro lit the candle of love and Daryl Hermann and Deb Krogman lit the Christ Candle on Christmas Eve!

We again offered the Community-Wide Blue Christmas Service of Solace and Comfort. Deacon Georgia preached a very touching and moving sermon and we had numerous people from the community participate including people from Elk River Lutheran, Union Church and others. The weather didn't cooperate and it impacted participation. Thanks to all of you who participated in this very powerful liturgy of hope and comfort in spite of the weather. The Annual Advent/Christmas Pageant took the form of an Advent Festival of Lessons and Music. Our youth were some of the lectors and they did an excellent job. They were: Eric Andersen, Elijah Campbell, Gabriel Campbell, Vernis Campbell and Jackson Stewart. Other lectors were Jane Lindenfelser, Gail Weber and Ken Schultz.

Christmas Eve was a holy night with two Candlelight Services at 4:00pm and 8:00pm. Adelle and Elliot Robinson brought the Baby Jesus to the manger and placed the Baby in the crib while we sang Silent Night in the 4:00pm Eucharist. Dave Fensch did the same at the 8:00pm Eucharist. All in all, we had over 100 people involved in this yearly celebration of Jesus' birth. Thanks to the Choir for their singing at the 4:00pm service and to all those who came and sang at the 8:00pm service. Both were glorious and heartfelt celebrations. I have to say that I missed a number of you as we thought offering a second service would meet almost everyone's needs. Perhaps we will try a 4:00pm and a 6:00pm next year or a 5:00pm and 7:00pm. Please give me or the Vestry your feedback.

2019 is in the past and we need to look ahead to fresh starts and new beginnings. The Epiphany season offers us such an opportunity. That's why I'd like to focus my article this month on the Epiphany and what it means for you and me.

"Wise men from the East came to Jerusalem where 'he who has been born king of the Jews'. We have seen his star in the East and have come to worship him." So Matthew, alone among the Gospel

writers, records that extraordinary visit of the wise men which we celebrate for seven Sundays - the Feast of the Epiphany and the consecutive Sundays after the Epiphany.

Ever since I was little I have been fascinated by this story. The thought of the strange Oriental figures following a star. I have often wondered what it is that caused these men who must have been wealthy, respected and no doubt comfortable – what made them leave their homes and go on this dangerous journey into a strange land. T.S. Eliot in the Journey of Magi imagines how difficult the journey must have been: "A cold [?] we had of it. Just the worst time of the year for such a long journey. The ways deep, the weather sharp, the very dead of winter."

He imagines they must have thought of turning back: "There were times we regretted the summer palaces or slopes, the terraces and the silken girls bringing sherbert."

Yet, Matthew tells us they persevered and reached their goal. They came to Jesus and bowed down and worshiped him. And then he says, "they departed to their country by another way." Back to the summer palaces, the silken girls and sherbert? Yet how could they ever be the same again – for they had seen the Christ and they had believed.

T.S. Eliot, at the end of his poem writes, "we returned to our palaces, these kingdoms, but no longer at ease here, in the old dispensation, with an alien people clutching their gods."

God had broken into their comfortable lives and profoundly disturbed them. They had known they had to leave everything behind and follow that star.

So the Bible and the whole history of the Church is a continual story of this God breaking into people's lives and disturbing them. Look at Paul: I am quite happy; thank you very much – I'm proud that I was circumcised on the 8th day, of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews, a Pharisee, a zealous persecutor of the church – as to righteousness under the Law I am blameless.

However God found a chink in his armor of pride and self-reliance – and he broke through it. So bright was Paul's Epiphany that he was blinded by it and for the rest of his life he suffered because of it. He left all his security behind and followed his Lord into a world of risk, uncertainty, suffering, beatings, shipwrecks, imprisonment and death. Yet, he says in the Letters to the Philippians, everything I had before – status, wealth, education – I count as worthless because of the surpassing worth of having Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of everything – but I consider all that as rubbish if only I can have Christ.

History is strewn with such people: St. Anthony of Egypt, St. Francis of Assisi, St. Benedict, and maybe some of you at Holy Trinity: all who were living a comfortable, untroubled existence, until YOU experienced the Epiphany of God in their lives. And, like the first disciples, you left everything and followed Christ.

They weren't masochists, somehow punishing themselves, as some kind of penance – they changed their lives because they'd seen something better. They had glimpsed something or someone so wonderful that every thing which had seemed so important to them before was no longer important. As Donatus put it: "Christians are a quiet and holy people who have discovered a joy a thousand time better than this sinful world."

The Letter to the Hebrews, Chapter 11, describes the same thing with all the great figures of the Old Testament, from Abraham onwards who obeyed God's call and left

behind their old existence and country because of the things promised by God. "They were not yet in possession of them, but they had seen them far ahead." For here we have no abiding city, but we seek they city that is to come."

What about you and me? Have you had experiences of God which have broken into your life: Moments of transcendence and meaning for you. They can be very disturbing. They can start making us feel guilty, or uneasy – make us ask difficult questions about our way of life. For some people, such experiences of God so threaten their lives that they refuse to listen or respond and as a poet put it "they seal up their souls."

Yet God will not allow us to live our lives on the purely materialistic level – he will carry on disturbing us, challenging us, making us feel uneasy, making us long for a homeland beyond the familiar. Job says to his friends, "O have pity on me, for the hand of God is upon me!" St. Augustine said, "Our heart is restless until it rests in you!"

The writer Castile said in a sentence which has always meant so much to me, "The misfortune of man/woman has its source in his greatness: for there is something infinite in him, and he cannot succeed in burying himself completely in the finite."

But by God we try! In that poem by T.S. Eliot, when the wise men return to their land, changed by the encounter with God, they say "We returned to our palaces, but no longer at ease here, in the old dispensation, with other people clutching their gods." Those wise men had seen something so great that they were changed, no longer completely at home – and to return home and see those people clutching their gods – no, they must have felt –they aren't going to help you – they're an illusion: you're called to be children of God – your hope is in him, your life is hid with Christ, he is your life and your light and your salvation.

When you have grasped that you can't return to the old ways. When God disturbs you, breaks into your life – just when everything seemed nice and comfortable – be thankful – for that is God's Epiphany to you! It is the source of our greatness and our dignity as children of God, that God won't let us be comfortable with the familiar, the materialistic and the values of this world. We have here no abiding city! But we seek a city that is to come. You and I are on a pilgrimage, a journey towards God!

My prayer for each of us in 2020 is that God will come to you and me and challenge you and disturb you but that is only done to you so you may become more the person that God wants you to be – because then, and only then, will you know the answers to your longings – the peace of God which passes all understanding! Have a meaningful Epiphany season and many epiphanies!

In closing, thank you for your 2020 Pledges and your time and talents in God's service all year long. Stewardship is "Everything we do after we say, "I believe." Stewardship is a whole-life concept calling for the right use of all the resources that God has given us. Gratitude knows no season! Generosity is a year-round practice for Christians. Our theme this year was Shining Our Light and with your contributions our mission and ministries will continue to flourish. We believe that it is by virtue of our baptism that we are called to the ministry of stewardship all year long. We appreciate very much too your generous response to this year's Christmas Appeal.

Finally, a recent visitor wrote to me, "We were all mightily impressed by the friendliness of the Holy Trinity congregation. You have a true and lively Christian community." You instinctively and naturally bring people to Christ without oftentimes even knowing it. We continue to grow not just by numbers alone but for people looking for a spiritual home where Christ's love is practiced and preached. People are yearning for connections these days beyond a iPhone and "screen" time. They want true friends and genuine relationships. It's all here at Holy Trinity and it's because of each of YOU! 


