We again offered the **Community-Wide Blue Christmas Eve Eucharist of Solace and Comfort.** Many people made the time to participate in this very powerful liturgy of hope and peace. As far as I know, our church was the only Elk River church to offer it. Many of you came and found it very beneficial.

Christmas Eve was a glorious celebration of Christ's birth with candlelight and beautiful music. Gideon Campbell, son of Dustin and Mo Campbell, placed the Christ Child in the crib as we sang Silent Night.

On December 26th we had a **Festive Service of Lessons** and Carols with a video reflection from our Bishop, Bishop Loya. On January 2, 2022, we celebrated the Feast of The Epiphany and had two baptisms - Ian Ngoye and Laurie Peck. It was a very moving liturgy with godparents, sponsors and families in attendance. Prayers for Ian and his family as well as for Laurie Peck who has just joined Holy Trinity. (Ian is the son of Trinitarians: Victoria McHome and Richard Ngoye).

2022 is probably a year that is anticipated by many to be more hopeful as 2021 had been yet another chaotic and disruptive year. As we begin this new year rather than focusing on New Year Resolutions, I'd like to focus

on "becoming who you are" and basing my thoughts on a scripture from Luke 12:48.

From everyone to whom much has been given, much will be required; and from the one to whom much has been entrusted, even more will be demanded. Luke 12:48

This gospel passage has two layers of meaning. One layer is a prediction about the Messiah's return to the earth, what the church has called "the second coming of Jesus Christ." A second layer is about our accountability to God for the life entrusted to us... which presumes several things:

For one, that we've been given life. We did not create ourselves. We didn't wake up some morning on a far-off planet and determine it was time to be born into this world, on a certain date, in a certain locale, with a certain look, with certain gifts and needs, to certain parents, who would raise us in a certain way. Not so. We were simply born into a particular setting with particular circumstances. And those first half-dozen or so years – before we had much power or could exercise much control at all in our own lives – we were very significantly formed (or maybe deformed) by those circumstances into which we were born... and which we did not choose.

Another presumption about the life entrusted to us is how unremarkable we are in actuality. Whether we are a prince or a pauper or something in between, we must eat and drink and sleep; we have the capacity to hope and dream; we have muscles, and a memory, and a will. From a physiological standpoint, our genetic makeup is almost identical, one person to the next. And, at the end of the day, all of us die.

But then, in quite small but extremely significant ways, we *are* remarkably different from one another: our gender, the shape of our nose, our desires and abilities and capacities, given all that has been handed to us, and how we have taken up the reins. And it's in these subtle uniquenesses about our own life, where we must give an ultimate account to God for what we have made of our life.

The energy in Jesus' teaching is about our being prepared: being prepared to die but in the meantime and more importantly being prepared to live. Living our lives fully, freely, generously, fearlessly, responsibly, respectfully, unapologetically, thankfully, joyfully the mysteriously, fabulously-amazing life entrusted to you and me. Entrusted to us a day-at-a-time, one step-at-a-time, one breath-at-a-time. You don't want to miss a moment of it – your life – because life is so precious and it's so fleeting!

I want to amplify on being true to yourself with a story. The story is told of Rabbi Zusya, an 18th century Polish rabbi, much revered for his wisdom.

One day he stood before his congregation and he said, "When I die and have to present myself before the celestial tribunal, they will not ask me, 'Zusya, why were you not Moses?' because I would say, 'Moses was a prophet and I am not.'

They would not say, 'Zusya, why were you not Jeremiah?' for I would say, 'Jeremiah was a writer, and I am not.'

And they would not say, 'Why were you not Rabbi Akiba,' for I would tell them, 'Rabbi Akiba was a great teacher and scholar and I am not.'

But then they will say, 'Zusya, why were you not Zusya?' and to this I will have no answer.'

Become who you were created to be, by God's grace this New Year of 2022! And then be who you are, by God's grace. Be fully alive. Live the mysteriously, fabulously-amazing life you've been given. Amazing!

In closing, thank you to those of you who pledged for 2022. Our financial situation is not a good one and you will be receiving a letter from the Wardens shortly about it. Suffice to say, please reconsider a Pledge if you haven't made one so we can more accurately plan the 2022 Budget. Without a pledge no matter what amount - \$5.00, \$50.00 or \$5,000.00, it's just a guessing game as to predict the monies we might receive. Your response to the Christmas Appeal is very much appreciated. If you forgot to donate, there are still red Christmas envelopes in the church for it or otherwise use PayPal on our website to make a donation. It's safe and easy.

COVID continues to impact us but we are determined to move forward safely and to provide the offerings and ministries we have in the past. If you haven't been back to church in person at all in 2021, why not resolve to do so in 2022? The Vestry will decide the date of the All-Parish Meeting at its January meeting. It will be held on a Sunday before the end of February as the season of Epiphany this year is January 6th – February 27th.

During the annual meeting you will get reports from Fr. Rob, members of the Vestry and other groups serving Holy Trinity. You will get a report on the financial status of the Parish. We will also hear a report from Guardian Angels of Elk River. (Holy Trinity is the founder/parent organization of Guardian Angels.) You will see and be asked to approve a proposed budget for the year. There will also be an election to replace outgoing Vestry members. If you are interested in serving on the Vestry, be sure to contact Fr. Rob to talk about your interests and what serving might entail. The Episcopal Church Canons and the Holy Trinity by-laws state that the Priest oversees the spiritual affairs of the Parish, and the Vestry oversees the temporal affairs of the Parish.

Fr. Rob and the Vestry have done everything possible to make Sunday worship safe for all. We are distanced, masked, sanitizer readily available. Communion is in the form of bread only and fellowship afterwards has been discontinued. It's obvious how much we miss each other at our Sunday Eucharistic celebrations by the greetings before and lingering afterwards. Re-Visioning and Renewing: Discerning Leadership for Redeveloping Congregations An Online Retreat Wednesdays: January 19 & 26, and February 2 & 9 Participant registration: \$350

Self-knowledge and assessment of one's own particular gifts for leadership are immensely important for your discernment to minister in a redeveloping parish. Our inperson and virtual retreats are designed to give you feedback around the competencies found in the <u>DLRC Assessment Grid</u>. They involve reflection on missional theology, conversations about the life of a church, neighborhood exegesis exercises, and an in-depth behavioral interview process. At the end of the month, you will be offered feedback and a recommendation of "it's a fit," "it's not a fit," or "it's potentially a fit." If you have a sense of calling toward church/community redevelopment and are drawn to the practices of Asset Based Community Development and Participatory Leadership and want to be a creative and adaptive change agent, then consider attending this Re-Visioning and Renewing DLRC retreat! For more information about the kinds of redeveloping congregations who partner in this work, explore our website.

Our Winter Virtual DLRC Retreat will run for four consecutive Wednesdays: January 19 & 26 and Feb. 2 & 9. In order to accommodate all time zones, the hours each day will be from 9 am - 2 pm (Pacific), 10 am - 3 pm (Mountain), 11 am - 4 pm (Central), 12 pm - 5 pm (Eastern). There will be time built in for breaks and simple "homework" will be assigned between weeks. We ask that you plan to be present for the entire time and for all four sessions. If at all possible, please reserve the entire day when we meet - give yourself the benefit of "retreat" and consider using the rest of the day for rest and reflection. Registrations will be reviewed as they are received, and early registration is recommended due to limited capacity. Please also note that there is pre-retreat work to be completed by January 5. You will be emailed links to this work upon completing your registration.

Cyberbullying + Texting + Screen Time + Toxic Images = Yikes! As technology grows and adapts, children are growing and adapting right along with it. The online highway can have some steep learning curves for students and for parents. Youth can find themselves in over their head as technology choices move faster than their developmental abilities. Technology isn't a bad thing, but young people need help in navigating this tool so that their empathy and sense of self can also grow and develop. This presentation details the risks students are facing, and practical, positive ways that adults can respond.

Led by Alison Feigh, MS, a lifelong Episcopalian and Youth Minister. Alison is the Director of Jacob Wetterling Resource Center, a program of Zero Abuse Project. In this role, she works with students, parents, youth workers, faith leaders, law enforcement and the media to help prevent abuse and abductions. Alison's work also includes writing curriculum for youth-serving organizations, training professionals about the online challenges kids face and advocating for families of the missing.
