

This week I visited the Cathedral of Our Merciful Saviour in Faribault. I hoped that somehow there might be a record of our own incorporation papers since Bishop Whipple was involved in the land purchase for Holy Trinity. Reverend James Zotalis, the Dean of the Cathedral and my tour guide assured me that they would not have any such thing. He said that they were notorious record keepers at that time.

The Cathedral of Our Merciful Saviour is the first Cathedral to be built as a Cathedral in the American Church. It was built by the Rt. Rev. Henry Benjamin Whipple, D.D., L.L., D., First Bishop of Minnesota, as his own church. Rev. Whipple was persuaded to come to Faribault by Rev. James Lloyd Breck. He and his colleague, Rev. David Sanford had built a parish church, The Church of The Good Shepherd, two blocks west of the present Cathedral building. The community raised \$4,000 and Alexander Faribault, a French-Canadian fur trader and a Roman Catholic, donated seven acres of land. In 1862 the building of "The Bishop's Church" began. It was not completed until 1869. The building was consecrated in 1869 by Rt. Rev. Jackson Kemper, Bishop of Wisconsin.

Dr. Breck had established a parish school prior to Bishop Whipple's arrival. It was the beginning of Shattuck Grammar School. In 1866, Bishop and Mrs. Whipple began St. Mary's Hall in their own house. A thriving Episcopal community worshiped in the new Cathedral.

I learned so much more—interesting history like attempted murder during a Sunday morning service, Bishop Whipple's special relationship with the Indians and other facts, which I will share next newsletter.

I was shocked to learn that present day Sunday worship at the Cathedral may only be attended by less than 20 persons. Rev. Zotalis was equally shocked that our little church usually has twice that number. More next newsletter.

Keys, Door Codes and Safe Church.

First of all, to any of you who have keys or door codes to the church, you are owed a huge thank you! If you have one or both of these, it's because you volunteered your time, talent and hard work as part of this special faith family. THANK YOU!

We seem to have a number of different kinds of locks so we are trying for some consistency. In the meantime, please double check when you lock up whatever facility/door you used that the lock is engaged.

Safe Church has been revised and is offered in a much more user-friendly format. It is divided up into sections so that you only need take sections that pertain to your role in the church. You will get an email from Emily in the office with instructions on what parts you have to take and an invitation from Praesidium Academy with instructions on how to access the training. It is all online and you can take each section at home when convenient. These lessons are short, usually about 15 minutes each and will take much less time than in previous years. When you have completed, please let Emily in the office know and she will print out the transcript for the office file. If you remain in the role which requires Safe Church, it is necessary to repeat every three years. Hopefully by the time three years go by they will have developed a short refresher course.

Meet The Rev. Mark Moore

In order to get to know one another a little better I was asked to write a short bio for you all. As most of you know I am originally from Illinois, in the Chicago suburbs. And that makes me a Bears fan. After a couple of years (76 – 78) in Cleveland, OH moved to Southeastern Wisconsin and sold industrial equipment throughout the state. In 1990 we moved back to Illinois and eventually started my own business, again in industrial equipment. By 2000 I realized that I needed to respond to the call to the priesthood. I graduated seminary and was ordained in 2006 and began my ministry at St. Paul's in Water-town, WI. In 2012 I moved to St. Thomas of Canterbury in Greendale, WI and retired from there in 2018.

Sandra and I were married in 2016 and we each have two children. One in Chicago, Two in Minneapolis area, and one in Portland, OR. Since we wanted to be closer to children our best option was here in Minnesota. So, in 2020 we bought a fixer upper near Annandale. Our biggest challenge since moving here has been getting acclimated to a new area during the covid crisis. We are still cautious but are enjoying being part of a church community again both in Litchfield and Elk River and being closer to children and grandchildren.

Meet The Rev. Nate Castens

I grew up in small churches. My father was a Lutheran pastor and our family was well-suited to small congregations. Until my seminary internship my home parish numbered under 500 souls, and my first parish was a two-point call in south-



I also confess that I am still a Lutheran and, I hasten to add, I am also an Episcopalian. Call me a Lutherpalian or an Episcotheran; my Christian faith is expressed most meaningfully for me in a worship setting and in the company of other faithful people gathered around good preaching and the Eucharist. When you sit in a pew waiting for service to begin, what do you notice? The people in front of you? The children across from you? The piano and organ? People coming through the door? The altar? Do you look through the bulletin?

Then the music starts, and the acolyte and celebrant walk down the aisle and up the steps to the altar. You then are probably concentrating on your hymnal or bulletin. Ever

wonder what is happening near the altar???

There's a solution if you are curious about that last statement above. You could become part of the altar party by being an acolyte, and then you would see very different thinas.

When my boys were young, they became acolytes at our church, and I was always curious about what that was like. I never had the chance to be an acolyte until a couple of years ago, here at Holy Trinity, and I have been grateful ever since.

In simplest terms, the acolyte dresses in traditional robes and assists the celebrant with whatever he/she needs. There is a process that the acolyte follows from lighting the candles before the service to extinguishing them at the end of service. In between, the acolyte becomes part of the choreography of the service. No one in the church pays attention to the acolyte as he/she moves around the altar providing the celebrant with items needed at various times. For the acolyte, this is a very different "picture" from what the congregations sees. For me, at least, there is a sense of holiness and blessing present at the altar that I never experience when I am "just in the pew."

If you are at all curious about this opportunity at church, pléase contact me. I will invite you to join me ON THE ALTAR for a service to experience this for yourself. Training to be an acolyte is very simple, not painful in the least, and would probably require your presence once a month. Think of this as a worthy and meaningful donation to your church.

Braver Angels

In February ECMN hosted a workshop entitled Depolarizing: *Respecting Others with Different Beliefs.* It was attended by 80 people. ECMN would like to support faith communities down the path of learning what it means and looks like to participate in the Holy Spirit's work to bring people together across lines of difference. Faith communities can lead the way, helping members and neighbors learn how to see God in and to listen to people who have different political opinions.

Resources available are:

- A Braver Angels workshop in your church, or in a community gathering place.
- A forum on the role of contemplative practices in reconciliation (with a Braver Angels workshop or separately).
- Information on how to start a Braver Angels chapter in your church or community.

The need for greater understanding and compassion across lines of difference is at an historic high. This is something we might pursue with one of the churches with whom we used to work. Union (United Church of Christ) and a close neighbor is actively involved in related activities. Please let someone on the Vestry know if you are interested.

SARI

What the heck is SARI? SARI stands for Sanctuary And Resistance to Injustice. Folks (mostly members of Union and Elk River Lutheran) from this group have been holding a vigil outside of the Sherburne County Jail every Wednesday, regardless of weather, for several years. The purpose of the vigil is to support and call attention to the plight of immigrants detained in the Sherburne County Jail. If you are interested, you can join this group any Wednesday from 3:30 – 4:30 pm on the frontage road in front of the Sherburne County Courthouse and jail. Our bishop, Rt. Rev. Craig Loya visited the county commissioners on behalf of the detained immigrants and SARI. Below is the statement he made.



My name is Craig Loya and I am the Bishop of the Episcopal Church in Minnesota.

In the tradition I represent, there is no greater moral imperative than welcoming the stranger, and offering love and compassion to

those on the margins of society. Offering generous welcome to immigrants is one of the core values of the more than 16,000 Minnesota Episcopalians I represent, including many residents of Sherburne County. The Episcopal Church has called again and again on its members to take action to achieve justice for immigrants and refugees. The immigration policy in our country unjustly targets people of color, and exercises particularly reprehensible cruelty in the way it separates children from their families. Even more, ICE contracts offer financial incentives for local communities to support this cruelty and to keep their jails full.

My own family immigrated from Mexico in search of a better life, and if our policies and enforcement practices many decades ago had been as aggressively racist as they are today, I may very well not be standing here before you because my grandfather would have been separated from his family or incarcerated, and my family's story would have unfolded very differently. The policies and practices that ICE exercises in enforcing immigration laws cut against the values of my Christian tradition, the traditions of many other people of faith, and the values we hold most dear as Minnesotans. I urge you in the strongest possible terms to end ICE's contract with Sherburne County.

Fellow Parishioners:

Lent ended and with continued introspection and gratitude we began Holy Week with service on Palm Sunday led by Rev. Elaine Barber, Maundy Thursday led by Fr. Mark Moore, Good Friday led by our own Lyla Aaland and with peace, love and joy we celebrated Easter Sunday. It was a lovely service and I would like to thank Rev. Wanda Copeland for coming all the way down from Duluth to be our celebrant and thanks to our Altar Guild for making the church so lovely., As we continue to worship each Sunday, I would like to thank our supply priests, and especially Fr. Mark Moore and Fr. Nate Castens for their commitment to Holy Trinity.

I don't know how many of you watched the coronation of King Charles III, or care whether or not there is a new king of England, but I thought it might be a good time to tell a little about our connection to Great Britain and a little about the Episcopal Church since its break with Great Britain. It's interesting to think about the history: the king (Henry VIII) got rid of the pope and we got rid of the king (George III). Here is some more interesting stuff about us:

- The Episcopal Church, also known as the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States, was organized after the Revolutionary War to preserve the practices and beliefs of the Church of England without the vow of allegiance to the King as head of the religion.
- Episcopalians cite The Book of Common Prayer as what separates their services from that of the Roman Catholic Church.
- The idea of apostolic succession is very important in the Episcopalian Church. All bishops are ordained by at least three bishops; one of them must be able to trace his or her lineage back to one of the first three American bishops, and through them, back to the apostles.
- Historically, the members of the Episcopal Church have played leadership roles in many aspects of American life, including politics, business, science, the arts, and education. About three-quarters of the signers of the Declaration of Independence were affiliated with the Episcopal Church, and over a quarter of all Presidents of the United States have been Episcopalians. Historically, Episcopalians were overrepresented among American scientific elite and Nobel Prize winners.

<u>USHER RESPONSIBILITIES</u>

Being an Usher may be more important than you think!

You are one of the first faces a new-comer encounters coming through the front door. Greeting every-one with a simple "Good morning!" and a smile goes a long way in making all feel welcomed.

Usher duties include:

- 1. Placing the Welcome banner outside in front of the church and bringing it in after the service.
- 2. Unlock the front door before the service and lock it following the service.
- 3. Handing everyone a bulletin when they enter the church.
- 4. If needed, assist members/visitors in finding a place to sit.
- 5. In case of a large event, ushers can go to the front and excuse pews to go up for communion. This helps with those unfamiliar to our customs.
- 6. Ring the church bell before the service begins (9:55 a.m. 10:00 a.m.) Fun fact; usually ushers ring the bell nine (9) times!
- 7. Ask two (2) individuals to carry up the gifts of Bread, Water and Wine. This can be done before church begins or during sharing of the Peace. The gifts are carried up to the altar after the Peace is shared.
- 8. Collect the Offering using the offertory plates during the Offertory hymn.
- 9. Bring up the Offering at the Doxology and hand it to the Acolyte.
- 10. Place the kneeler in the center area in front of the pews for Communion.
- 11. Be the last person to take Communion and move the kneeler back in its place.
- 12. After the service pick up any leftover bulletins and any other paper inserts and place in recycling.
- 13. Take the garbage and recycling to the curb. Recycle schedule is on the refrigerator.
- 14. Count all people in the Sanctuary, Parish Hall, Nursery and fill out attendance ticket (found on table in the entry). After the service place the ticket on the record book in the Sacristy.

Most importantly, welcome people with a smile, a "good morning", and a bulletin. We are always looking for more volunteers; both women and men. A training session will be provided – only takes about 30 minutes to walk through the duties.
